WORKSHOP OUTCOMES

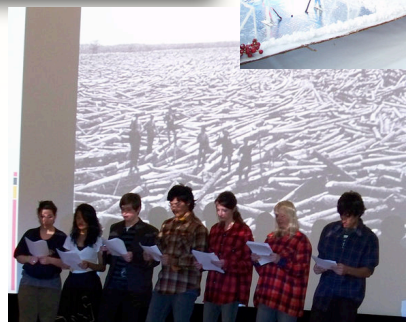
